

Firstly, (unless the date has already passed!)

the Patronal Festival for St Anne is on the **24th of July** at 10am. John Hargreaves will take the service, which will include some music and will be followed by refreshments (tea/coffee and scones). The church will be decorated with flowers for the occasion. Hope to see you there.

Secondly,

because, as some of you know, our curate Aron Simpson will be leaving in July to take up a new position at Swanwick, near Alfreton (for which we all wish him and his family well) it is likely that the Sundays when services take place at St Anne's will change. At the moment we are expecting that it will be on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month, rather than the 1st and 4th as at present (which is a better balance) but details will be confirmed through posters, etc., at a later date.

Thirdly,

we will be celebrating the Festival of **Harvest** in the latter part of September, but again details will be publicised nearer the time. Despite the great majority of us not being as directly dependent upon the annual harvest for our livelihood (or even for our survival) as our ancestors were, it is important that we celebrate the bounty of God's earth, and the fruits of our labours, in the annual Harvest Festival service. The church will, of course, be decorated with the glorious flowers of early Autumn and everyone is invited to contribute harvest gifts, either fresh fruit or vegetables which you may have grown yourselves, or purchased tins, packets, jars, etc., of food which we can donate to those in greater need than ourselves, of whom, unfortunately, the numbers are still growing. In the last couple of years they have gone to the Buxton Food Bank.

Fourthly,

let me remind you that St Anne's church stays unlocked all the time, the outer door being left open (except in very bad weather) and this is much appreciated by the many visitors who call in. The visitor's book, on the table at the back, has comments from some of the visitors, most of whom express thanks for finding an unlocked church, and for its beauty and tranquillity. One recently commented that it was the first church they had visited for some time which had fresh flowers on the altar.

The small **book stall** at the back (for purchase, exchange or borrowing) has been getting in need of some "refreshment" recently, so any additions, especially of children's books, would be most welcome.

We next meet on 12th September at 8pm in the Village Hall.



Better Derbyshire Dales Fund

Local voluntary sector organisation, Derbyshire Dales CVS, is administering several of Derbyshire Dales District Council's small grants – these include the Village Hall, Arts Development, Band Concerts, Play Development, Open Churchyards, Car Parking and Community grant schemes. The Better Derbyshire Dales Fund awards grants to support the work of new or existing community groups or organisations that are working within the Derbyshire Dales and are in need of capital or revenue funding.

Derbyshire Dales District Cllr Joanne Wild says:

“One of the benefits to working with the CVS is that where the Better Derbyshire Dales Fund cannot provide any financial support or only part financial support to a project, the CVS is well placed to advise applicants on how and where to look for other funding sources.”

The Better Derbyshire Dales Fund will support organisations or specific projects that aim to develop or strengthen communities and/or people's health and well-being. We are also interested in supporting less popular causes and work that supports disadvantaged and marginalised sections of the community.

The grants-scheme also includes money from North Derbyshire CCG and Derbyshire County Council Public Health and therefore we welcome applications from community groups doing something that has a health and well-being benefit.

There are quarterly rounds for applications with the next closing date being Friday 4th November 2016. The final round for this financial year will be February 2017 but we hope the scheme will continue next year.

A VERY Talented Man.....David Onac

Dr. David Onac, who grew up in Over Haddon and attended Lady Manners School, is becoming a well-known figure in the music world. Having attained no less than five university degrees in Music (an M.A. and an M.Phil from Cambridge University, an M.Mus and an LRSM from the Royal Northern School of Music and a PhD from Manchester University), he has worked for the last two years as a Teaching Fellow at the University of Birmingham where he has been teaching and lecturing in classical composition, orchestration and harmony, and 20th Century jazz.

Over the last few years, he has won numerous national and international music competitions and his compositions have been aired on the BBC, performed by major orchestras, played at the Cheltenham Music Festival and recorded on various albums. David also plays as a freelance pianist with various jazz musicians and singers across the UK and undertakes musical commissions for anyone who might like to have a new musical work dedicated exclusively to their name.

In addition, as Musical Director of Manchester Harmony Gospel Choir who were the winners of national University Gospel Choir of the Year competition for two years running, he was recently invited to participate with the choir in the finals of the BBC Gospel Choir of the Year 2016 competition in London.

The competition and awards ceremony will be aired on two of the BBC's 'Songs of Praise' programmes in September/October 2016, so keep a look out for these programmes in your TV-times.

You've both been dedicating a lot of time to the grit stone this winter when the rest of the climbing contingency seems to have given up. It seems grit stone has gone out of fashion this year. What are your views on this?

Sam: Its funny the whole gritstone psyche. Its seems to go in stages of a few ascents of some hard stuff in quick time to then being very quiet with hardly anything being done. Bouldering wise is different as it's so popular and people are always out doing stuff but trad isn't so popular and its very rare to see people on E3/4's let alone harder stuff. I think a lot of people want to just skip out a lot of the classic mid-grade routes and jump onto something hard for the big numbers to tell all there mates. Its a bit of a shame. I've always been a firm believer that you work your way up through the grades, becoming solid at each grade before jumping to the next and enjoying the whole process. I enjoy climbing a classic HVS as much as I do a big E7!

Where's the next new grit stone destination you're planning on scooping out together?

Ed: We've been waiting to get up to Wimberry and some of the Moorlands crags since last summer as we had some great days up there when everyone else was down at the Tor! The climbing's incredible, with a real feel of remoteness compared to most gritstone cliffs and they come into condition when everywhere else is too hot, as they face north. Basically like venturing to unusual places off the beaten track and not following the crowds! That's how our family works

Who is the best at cooking on your trips away together?

Sam: Cooking wise? Ed's a real beast in the kitchen! You should try his pasta and tuna delicacy.

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
